Course Description

Orchestral literature from preclassic to present including symphony, concert overture, incidental music, program symphony and tone poem. Emphasis on standard literature.

Course Objectives

At the end of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Name and summarize the fundamental genres and structures in the symphonic canon;
- 2. Name key composers and summarize both their mature musical style(s) and important contributions to the development of symphonic music;
- 3. Identify selected pieces from the symphonic canon, list their fundamental structural and stylistic characteristics, and summarize their significance in the development of symphonic music.

Evaluation and Grading Policies

A student's final percentage grade in this course will be calculated to one (1) decimal place (e.g. 86.5%). A grade with a decimal of 0.8 or above will rounded up to the next whole number (e.g. 79.8 will round up to 80). The final letter grade will be assigned using the following scale:

Quizzes

There will be a total of seven (7) quizzes this semester. Each quiz will be multiple choice and administered through D2L. Each quiz will include content and listening identification questions. At the end of the course the one (1) lowest quiz grade will be dropped when calculating this portion of the final course grade.

Final Examination

There will be one (1) final examination at the end of the semester. The examination will consist of short-answer questions about genres, pieces, and the evolution of symphonic music. No portion of the final examination may be dropped.

Composer Snapshot Presentations

Each student will lead two (2) "Composer Snapshot" presentations during the semester. Presentations will be made on the dates the composer is the focus of a course meeting, as listed on the course schedule. Each presentation should be approximately 15 minutes in duration and will include a visual element (e.g. PowerPoint slideshow). Audio and video samples are welcome, when appropriate. The content of the presentation should comprise composers' birth and death dates, associated era in music history, a biographical overview, key elements of their compositional style(s), and major works. Neither of the Composer Snapshot presentation grades may be dropped.

Discussion Participation

The majority of course meeting time will be spent discussing as a group the composer and specific piece assigned on a given day. Students are expected to spend time outside of class listening to assigned repertoire with musical scores and completing assigned readings so that they are prepared to actively engage in discussion during course meetings. The instructor will evaluate each student's level of discussion engagement at every class meeting and assign a grade of up to ten (10) points. Students will lose points for lack of active engagement and participation in class discussions, as well as unexcused lateness or absence. At the end of the course the two (2) lowest discussion participation grades will be dropped when calculating this portion of the final course grade.

Course Policies

Academic Honesty: Cheating, plagiarism, and any other forms of academic dishonesty are unacceptable. At a minimum, all instances of cheating and plagiarism will result in the grade of zero (0) for the assignment. Students engaging in flagrant plagiarism or cheating will receive no credit for their assignment; in instances of such a violation the instructor will notify the Department of Student Conduct and Academic Integrity (SCAI) and recommend that the maximum disciplinary action allowed by university policy be pursued.

Attendance Policy: Punctuality and attendance are expected at all class meetings. In the event of a lateness or absence, the instructor retains ultimate authority and discretion as to the determination of a lateness or absence as excused or unexcused. The instructor evaluates each request for an excused lateness or absence on a case-by-case basis; while each situation is unique, the following general principles apply.

- 1. It is the responsibility of the <u>student</u> to initiate a request for an excused lateness or absence and to follow up on the request, as appropriate. All lateness and absences are considered unexcused until the student initiates a request for an excused lateness or absence via email and the instructor replies with a final determination via email.
- 2. The instructor may request additional information or documentation regarding the lateness or absence.
- Students must request an excused lateness or absence by <u>emailing</u> the instructor in advance of the lateness or absence. (Note: An email to <u>nparke22@kennesaw.edu</u> is the only form of communication that will be accepted as a request for an excused lateness or absence. Requests submitted by other means will not be considered.)
- 4. All requests for an excused lateness or absence placed after the lateness or absence occurs will be denied except in the cases of illness or personal emergency.

<u>Communication</u>: The instructor will only respond to emails sent to <u>nparke22@kennesaw.edu</u>; please do not use D2L email. The instructor will not respond to emails sent from non-KSU email addresses; use only your @students.kennesaw.edu email address. The instructor will not discuss grades via email or phone; you must schedule an appointment. The instructor will respond to emails in the order in which they are received, with the exception of emergency situations. If you have not received a response within 48 hours, please re-send your email.

<u>Course Meetings</u>: As mentioned under "Discussion Participation," above, course meeting time will be spent discussing as a group the composer and specific piece assigned on a given day. Students are expected to spend time outside of class listening to assigned repertoire with musical scores and completing assigned readings so that they are prepared to actively engage in discussion during course meetings.

<u>Feedback</u>: Grades will be posted in the D2L gradebook as soon as they are available, typically within five (5) business days.

<u>Make-Up Work</u>: Students are responsible for meeting all due dates posted in the course schedule (below) and the calendar on D2L. As a general rule, make-up work is not permitted for any assignments or examinations. Students who encounter unanticipated challenges causing them to miss deadlines should contact the instructor directly as soon as possible; in those circumstances the instructor will make every reasonable effort to offer accommodations. Any accommodations will be made on a case-by-case basis.
