PSYC 1101, is part of a textbook program called Day One Access. The week before classes begin, you should receive an e-mail from KSU University Stores with instructions on how to

### **Measurable Learning Objectives**

- ~ Identify fundamental vocabulary of the sub-disciplines (e.g., biopsychology, learning and behavior, cognition and memory, development, social, and abnormal) of psychology by recognizing and recalling the basic definitions of psychological concepts, theories, and methods (e.g., recalling that psychology is defined as “the scientific study of behavior and mental processes”)
- ~ Identify psychological concepts, theories, and methods by developing an understanding of these components (e.g., not only being able to recall the definition of psychology, but also being able to explain why psychology is a science)
- ~ Compare and contrast psychological concepts, theories, methods, and pioneers with one another by identifying their similarities and differences (e.g., understanding why Watson’s, Skinner’s, and Bandura’s theories are all examples of behaviorism, but that Bandura differed from Watson and Skinner because he emphasized how learning can be influenced by mental events and the observation of others)
- ~ Apply psychological concepts, theories, and methods by using them to solve problems or challenges involving behaviors or mental processes (e.g., finding a solution to manage stress by identifying the stressors in a real-life example and developing ways of reducing or coping with them)
- ~ Identify how variables such as sociocultural differences, nature, and nurture can affect how we think and act
- ~ Demonstrate critical thinking through meaningful discussion and dialogue of psychological concepts and issues with your classmates.

## **SONA RESEARCH EXPERIENCE**

The Department of Psychological Science is committed to advancing the scientific study of behavior and mental processes. Students taking PSYC 1101 will get “hands on” experience by participating in research offered through Sona.

This assignment is worth approximately 5% of the final course grade. Students will complete a total of **1 credit hour** of research-related activities through SONA to earn their points. No partial credit will be awarded. On August 25, 2021 students will be able to log into the SONA system using their KSU credentials.

\*Login to SONA often to sign-up for available studies to get your required credits completed. Signup availability will vary during the semester. There may be no studies left to participate in during the last few weeks of the semester.\*

### **What is Sona?**

Sona is the software program used by the KSU Psychology Dept. Students login to the online software program to sign up as a participant in a psychology study to earn credits toward the PSYC 1101 Research Experience Requirement.

### **Where is Sona?**

You can download the mobile app. It is called "Sona Mobile" and it is free.

You will also find a link to Sona in Desire2Learn (D2L) on your course homepage and in the syllabus. You can use this link for easy access or you can type in the address, which is <http://kennesaw.sona-systems.com>.

### **Where is my Sona Login and Password?**

After the end of add/drop, students will receive an email from KSU Psychology Dept. Sona Research Participation System in their KSU student email account that will provide them with their SONA user name and password. Your User name is the same as your KSU Net ID, but Sona will assign you a password. Check your KSU email for your login information and password. It may go in your spam or junk mail folder, so be sure to check there also. It does not go to your D2L email; only your KSU email address.

### **What if I can't find my login email after the second week of classes?**

Go to the Sona link <http://kennesaw.sona-systems.com> and click on the Lost your password? link. Type in either your KSU email address or your KSU Net ID and your password will be emailed to you.

### **How to Earn Your Required Credits**

Students will login to Sona to view available studies. You will read the descriptions of the studies and sign up for those you wish to participate in. Various studies are available at different times throughout the semester. You need to check for the availability of studies regularly during the semester. It is not something you can do in one day or one week, usually. Do NOT wait until the last few weeks of the semester to try and complete your requirement or you may find that there are not enough studies available at that time to complete the requirement and you will not be able to earn the 5% of your grade that comes from this assignment.

### **When are credits awarded?**

Researchers manually have to post credits. They do so at least weekly, but often sooner. You can find the information about when to expect your credit to be posted in the study description. If you are not awarded credit for your participation, then you should email the researcher of the study after at least one week has passed.

### **Types of Studies**

There are two types of studies in Sona. There are online studies and in person or face to face studies. You must note whether the study is an online participation or an appointment for an in person or face to face participation. Based on the description, you will be able to determine what kind of study it is.

### **Online Studies**

When you sign up for an online study, you are usually participating in a survey of some kind unless otherwise specified. You are expected to participate in the online study shortly after signing up. The sign up date listed for online studies is the last day and time that you may participate, but you are encouraged to participate much sooner than that date.

## Face to Face/ In Person Studies

When you sign up for a face to face or in person study, you are signing up for a specific timeslot at a specific location. You are making an appointment with the researcher just as you would if you were making a dentist appointment. It is your responsibility to remember all contact information (dates, times, researchers, campus, buildings, room numbers, etc.) for your scheduled appointment time for the study. This information is provided to you at your sign up and in a follow-up email. Be sure to mark it in your calendar with contact information so that you do not fail to show up.

## Canceling Your Sign-up/ Appointment

If you cannot keep a research appointment or you no longer wish to participate in a study, you can cancel your sign-up. You can do this by logging in to Sona and selecting My Schedule/Credits and selecting cancel for the study you do not wish to participate in. Most studies have cancellation cut off times that are usually 24 hours in advance, but check the study information to be certain. If you cannot attend an in person research appointment, but you must cancel after the cancellation period ends (but before the appointment takes place), you must call or email the researcher of that specific study or the Psychology department to leave a message for the researcher.

## Last Day to Complete the Research Requirement

Students must complete their research participation no later than the last day of scheduled classes found on the Academic Calendar in the Registrar's website.

## The Alternative to Research Participation Option

As an alternative to participating in psychology research studies, students may gain research experience by completing a written research assignment. Students must sign up for an appointment for this alternative research credit in Sona and must report to the Psychology Lab (Social Science building, room 4026) at their appointed time to receive instructions for completing the assignment. You may sign up for this option more than once. Although anyone may choose this option, we find that most students prefer to participate in research studies to fulfill this requirement. Students may also contact the Psychology Lab Coordinator at [psychresearch@kennesaw.edu](mailto:psychresearch@kennesaw.edu).

## Dual Enrollment/Minors: Less Than 18-years-old

Generally, there are no research studies available to students who are minors. If you are younger than 18, then you are encouraged to complete the alternative research option early in the semester to fulfill the requirements for this assignment.

## Course Policies

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### Late Work

To be fair to all students, late work IS NOT EXCEPTED except for an unavoidable/unforeseeable event that has documentation. Since you have 1 week to complete quizzes, exams and online discussions, no late work is usually excepted. With these time allowances it is advised not to wait until the last day to complete your work, since as Murphy's Law says, "Anything that can go wrong will go wrong."

**One "Favor" Policy:** Each student will have one "favor". Once your favor is gone, it is gone. You cannot change your mind, so choose wisely. At the end of the semester, if you have not used your favor, you will earn 10 points of extra credit.

Examples of favors include:

24-hour extension on a quiz, 24-hour extension on graded assignment (e.g., writing assignment, participation activities), opening and exam early, and other things may be considered upon request.

### Extra Credit

See **One "Favor" Policy** above. Remember this class has 1000 possible points and you only need 900 for an A so there are many point opportunities throughout the course.

### Grade Appeals / Policy

If, for any assignment, you feel that the grading policy was unfair in some way, then you must make your case to me in writing via email. These emails must be received within one (1) week of the posting of your grade; do not wait until the end of the semester.



Once computed and verified, all course grades are final and will not be changed. Every semester, a student approaches me with a request that I raise his or her grade (because she or he will be placed on probation, because he or she will lose their Hope scholarship, because she or he won't be able to graduate as planned... or be accepted into graduate school, & etc.). Please do not ask me to change your grade. I am not trying to be mean or uncaring. Changing a student's grade to one that was not earned is unethical on my part and unfair to other students enrolled in the class.

**Respondus Lockdown Browser and Webcam** – are used to monitor students during the final exam to prevent cheating. It will be necessary for all students to use a computer with a camera and install/set-up the lockdown browser right before taking the final exam. When logging in to take the exam it will automatically walk you through the set up but allow time for this when preparing to take the exam. \*\*\*Chromebooks are not compatible with Respondus; therefore, you will need to have reliable access to a non-Chromebook laptop, desktop, or tablet.

### **More Information on Respondus:**

The webcam can be the type that's built into your computer or one that plugs in with a USB cable.

### Quiz- and Exam-Taking Rules – “The Do’s and Don’ts”

- Make sure your webcam and sound are working and on before starting LockDown Browser because you will be recorded to preserve the integrity of the assessment; a webcam with sound is required to ensure you're using only permitted resources.
- Read all of the on-screen instructions before beginning an assessment; I may add additional instructions during the semester.
- Be sure you are wearing clothing and that it is appropriate.
- Ensure you are in a location where you won't be interrupted
- Do not sit with a window behind you with light shining in or with room lighting that makes it difficult to see you on the video that is being recorded
- When you complete the environment scan, do so slowly.
- Remain at your desk or workstation for the duration of the assessment
- Do NOT move your computer around. I don't want to see the ceiling, floor, or walls during your assessment. You must stay in frame.
- Do not take the exam on your bed or have the computer sitting on your lap; it needs to be on a flat, solid surface such as a table or desk.
- You may not wear headphones, or earbuds during the assessment.
- You may not have another person in the room with you.
- You may not read the questions aloud or speak to another person during the assessment.
- If you have an emergency, then you can speak to leave me a message during the recording

- LockDown Browser will prevent you from accessing other websites or applications; you will be unable to exit the test until all questions are completed and submitted
- You MAY NOT use your textbook, notes, or other resources provided to you in the course.
- You MAY NOT use the assistance of another person during quizzes and exams.
